Minutes from the January 8, 2024 Meeting

An Officer was unable to join us this month for our meeting.

Michael discussed the following with our group:

- Michael discussed the release of employee job classification information by the Human Resource Committee especially regarding the pay rates and salary grades for water utility workers; it appears to be competitive with other communities. A review of costs for the Water Department will take place in June/July when a more accurate picture of the revenue and expenses for running the new facility should be available; potential utility rate changes would not be expected to occur until at least January 2025 since there is a specific process that must be followed for a rate change to be approved.
- TID #6 (located on the west side, north of Stewart Avenue to Bridge Street) will be extended for 1 more year. All the incremental funding that is generated by the extension will be used for affordable housing.

Ann shared these items with our group:

- Ann clarified that the County budget is made up of at least 12 different funds rather than 4, as mentioned last month; some funds are restricted while others are part of the general fund.
- Ann discussed the status of the childcare resolution previously discussed at County meetings. Although the resolution is currently on hold, it is still being considered. Ann shared that 84 childcare staff quit in October (due to wages, benefits or leaving the field entirely). Although 77 childcare staff were hired last year, 36 positions are still open in Wausau. There are currently 647 children on a waiting list with over 500 of them under the age of 2. Marathon County is hoping to find state and/or federal funding to assist in resolving this issue.

• Marathon County will receive a portion of the \$400 million in opioid funding the State of Wisconsin received. Ann let everyone know there will be a Public Safety and Health and Human Services Committee meeting tomorrow (1/9) at 2:15 to discuss the topic; it will also be available on YouTube. Vending machines with overdose supplies are located inside Health First and were funded through a state grant.

There was discussion about future meeting topics. Scheduling a speaker from the ADRC (Aging and Disability Resource Center) or AARP to speak to the group regarding support services for caregivers (in February) and scheduling a tour of our new polling location at the Health Care Center (in March) were suggested.

ARPA or the American Rescue Plan Act is coming to an end. This program awarded the city \$15.5 million as part of the recovery process from the pandemic. Unlike most grant programs, this one had some very basic guidelines, so the city was in control on how the money could be disbursed. The finance committee and common council had two goals, though: the funding should not be used primarily for one-time projects and not for continuing programs unless a future funding mechanism is identified and must have a transformative effect on our community. I believe, for the most part, that we achieved those goals. Some of the projects that we funded, in no particular order, are: funding to mitigate our PFAS contamination (water pitchers and a treatment pilot study); increasing the number of fire fighters; affordable housing initiatives; storm sewer and wastewater improvements; a new skate park; year round funding of the homeless shelter and warming center; lead water line replacement; closed captioning for city meetings aired on public access channels; LED street light conversion; and city communications infrastructure. With about \$1 million of funding left, we have until the end of 2024 to commit to projects and 2026 to spend it. But, even now we are starting to see the positive aspects of this once in a lifetime opportunity.
