Diny questioned if this property did not belong to the city but instead was the property of the developer, and further questioned why the city had charged them for taxes owed in 2022 and 2021. Discussion and possible action on 15-minute parking spaces on the south side of Washington Street between 2^{nd} Street and 3^{rd} Street

Larson suggested trying this for a year and see what happens. Rasmussen noted that we did well when we put a couple of 15-minute stalls mid-block along 3rd Street when there was a need for businesses that have quick services like carryout and pickup. Having 2 or 3 15-minute stalls gives quick service places spots to get in and out quick. She believes there are 3 spots in the block in front of Ciao and Polito's and Gisselman confirmed. Jimmy Johns is located in Washington Square on the south side of the building so the spots near Polito's would not serve them.

Larson asked if this is something we would want to revisit in a year or make permanent. Rasmussen stated the other spots along 3rd Street are permanent. Rasmussen feels these should also be permanent. If we find there is a need or the make up of tenants change, we can revisit. Wesolowski noted that Washington Street is scheduled to be reconstructed in 2025. The plan is to put parallel parking on both sides. It could be revisited at that time with some 15-minute stalls on the other side of the street.

Rasmussen moved to approve three 15-minute parking stalls on the south side of Washington between 2nd Street and 3rd Street with the directive to staff to reevaluate the parking along the street when the reconstruction is complete.

Gisselman stated there are other merchants on 3rd Street that may depend on 2-hour parking. As we add more 15-minute spots, it takes away 2-hour parking for longer term merchants. He asked how many 2-hour spots are along the stretch between 2nd and 4th Streets. Wesolowski stated there would still be a lot of 2-hour parking available.

Blake Opal-Wahoske explained this would not just benefit Jimmy Johns. There is the Chocolate Café that just opened up and a tailor on the 2nd floor of Washington Square. Henke added that there is a parking ramp a half block away that is always empty when he is there.

Larson asked if the signage could indicate during business hours only. Rasmussen indicated that parking is not enforced after 6:00 pm.

Henke seconded Rasmussen's motion and the motion passed 4-0.





The Wausau City Council recently approved the Green Tree Meadows Subdivision which is located east of 72nd Avenue, north of the existing Morgan Creek subdivision. The southeast corner of the approved preliminary plat is isolated due large wetlands in the area. The City owns an adjoining property that also includes an isolated peninsula of developable land surrounded by wetlands. As part of the discussions with the Developer the idea of adding the City owned property to the residential development was born.

The City-owned property outside of the mapped wetlands is approximately 3.1 acres and based on the layout provides a less than ideal layout for a typical use within the Business Campus. The developer is currently proposing 4 individual residential lots that would access directly off 72nd Avenue, which sees heavy traffic at peak times. Including the City-owned property would allow the Developer to create a short cul-de-sac road that would allow for more buildable lots and one access point for vehicles onto 72nd Avenue.


The City-owned property contains approximately 3.1 acres of upland, non-wetland area. Based on our standard per acre price of \$12,500 for the Business Campus, this would come to \$38,750. The additional land the surrounding wetlands will provide some buffer on the back of these properties to make it 6 acres with no additional cost to the buyer as this land is not developable.

Staff Recommendation: To direct City Staff to work with Green Tree Construction on the sale of 6-acres of land located in the northwest corner of 315 N. 72nd Street (29129073030996) to Green Tree Construction for residential development purpose for \$38,750.





NOW, THEREFORE, the parties here	to agree as follows:	

- 1. GRANTOR hereby grants to CITY a permanent easement across property owned by GRANTOR as hereinafter described, which easement shall be for the purpose of establishing and maintaining in perpetuity a pedestrian and bicycle path, motorized cart path, and ski trail, for the benefit of the public, which access shall specifically include but not be limited to individuals on foot, on bicycle, on roller blades, skateboards, cross-country skis, motorized wheelchairs, golf carts, and other similar conveyances, motorized vehicles operated for administrative and maintenance purposes, and other methods of conveyance approved and allowed by CITY; specifically excluded are ATVs, motorcycles, snowmobiles, and similar motorized recreational vehicles; the style of the path shall be similar to that as referenced on the landscape master plan, UDD plan, subdivision plan, and/or condominium plan across which the path runs.
- 2. The easement area is currently described on "Exhibit A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 3. GRANTOR shall construct, maintain, and keep in good repair the easement area and the path upon the easement area, at GRANTOR expense, and shall replace all or any portion of the path and related improvements, at any time, so as to maintain the standards provided for on the landscape master plan or any changes to that landscape master plan agreed to by CITY; in the event that GRANTOR fails to comply with the provisions of this easement agreement and specifically this paragraph, CITY may enter upon the easement area, across GRANTOR's property, to effect the necessary construction, maintenance, repair, replacement or other work necessary to maintain the easement area and path in the style of the landscape master plan or subsequent agreement; the cost of such CITY work shall be borne by GRANTOR, by special assessment pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 66 of the Wisconsin Statutes or its successor statute, the understanding being that any special assessment provisions then in existence shall apply.

- 8. This agreement shall run with the land, encumbering the property encompassed by the easement area in perpetuity, and shall be binding on and shall enure to the benefit of the parties hereto and to their respective successors and assigns. All rights of third party mortgages, lienholders or any other holders of encumbrances shall be subordinate to these easements.





I am interested in serving on the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee to use my interests in safe, accessible, and equitable transportation options to support the city's mission to enhance our community's quality of life and support a sense of belonging. I want to be a citizen who works with folks from all backgrounds to make a city that is easy to get around no matter what mode of transportation you choose or have access to.

My main qualification is that I am someone who commutes via bicycle most days to work, and that the bicycle is my main form of transportation. 

WHEREAS, your Fire Department has proposed creating a Community Care Paramedic program in the City of Wausau; and

WHEREAS, in other communities, the program has demonstrated a variety of benefits including increased access to medical services, reduced hospital readmissions, reduced unnecessary emergency room visits and improved efficiency in the health care system; and

WHEREAS, the program is proposed as a 3-year trial with funding shared by the City of Wausau, Aspirus Hospital, and the Judd S. Alexander Foundation; and

WHEREAS, the success of the program relies on the creation of an additional paramedic position with annual wages and benefits of approximately \$110,000; and

WHEREAS, the three-year financial plan includes \$65,000 of start-up equipment costs in the first year with future year estimated annual costs of \$130,000; and

WHEREAS, the Human Resources Committee has reviewed and recommends approval of the

Community Care Paramedic position; and

WHEREAS, on June 14, 2022, the Common Council approved the allocation of \$771,000 of American Rescue Plan Funding for the creation of three Firefighter positions; and

WHEREAS, on January 24, 2023, the Common Council approved allocating \$200,460 of the Fire Department ARPA allocation to equip and train the 12 new hires; and

WHEREAS, on January 23, 2024, the Common Council approved allocating \$115,000 of the Fire Department ARPA allocation to the 2024 funding of the Outreach Coordinator position; and

WHEREAS, your Finance Committee at their April 9, 2024, meeting reviewed and recommends expanding the eligible use of the Fire Department ARPA allocation to include funding the community care paramedic position for an amount not to exceed \$96,750; and

WHEREAS, your Finance Committee recommended the following budget modification to support the program creation.



- Program Summary: This request is to support the implementation of a Community Paramedic
 program in the City of Wausau Fire Department, to allow for updated research that will ideally
 produce the assumed cost savings and improved patient outcomes that are possible through
 such programs. This program has the broad interests and support of the Aspirus Hospital, The
 Alexander Foundation, and our collaborative community partners.
- 2. Program Description: Community paramedicine remains a relatively new and evolving model of community-based health care in which paramedics function outside of their customary emergency response and transport roles in ways that facilitate more appropriate use of emergency care resources and/or enhance access to continued primary care. These programs typically are designed to address specific local problems and to take advantage of locally developed linkages and collaborations between and among emergency medical services and other health care and social service providers, and thus, are varied in nature. National interest in community paramedicine has substantially grown in recent years based upon the belief that it may improve access to, and quality of care while simultaneously reducing costs. These goals have already been shown to be true in many pilot programs across the country.

Some of the delivery system problems targeted by community paramedic programs include the overuse of the 911 system, the need for alternative means to manage patients who do not require transport to an emergency department, repeat ED visits, hospital readmissions, limited or no capacity for short-notice home visits, especially during off hours, and supplementing primary care shortages in underserved areas (including those where primary care exists, but where the patient cannot or will not visit). These programs exist to reach those patients who do not qualify for traditional home health visits, or for those who are unreachable by traditional home health providers. These programs do not exist to replace home health care, but rather they exist to supplement the great work that is being done, and to fill the gaps where traditional programs meet restrictions for enrollment or for continued care.

3. **Goals and Objectives**: These include the priorities of improving their overall health and societal well-being, while simultaneously guiding their care to the most appropriate resource. We will look to identify patients who are high-volume callers of 911 for whom our pre-hospital partners have identified an acute change that has contributed to a high frequency of calls for service within a short time frame. The patients will be identified as qualifying for the program upon recommendation from physicians, RN's, case managers, care coordination, primary care physicians, medics, and through consultation with specific services. The goal would be to find a patient in an acute health care crisis, and then focus on returning them to a baseline level of

improved health, before transitioning them out of the program. At the time of transition, they will have a strong understanding of their care plan, a strong understanding of the resources available to them, a strong understanding of the preferred priority of access to these resources, and perhaps most importantly, they will have an empowerment to know how to access these resources. The final objective would be to summarize the findings, such that they may be used to successfully develop an ongoing source of budgeted funding to continue.

4. Each year, the need for health services to the community increases, as health care costs are ever increasing, and access to health care is difficult to navigate, despite great efforts from the health care community. Additionally, high-volume ER users frequently have a difficult time in adhering to care plans for a variety of reasons such as underlying mental illness, lack of resources to follow the plan, lack of understanding of the plan, a home environment that creates challenges to the success of the plan, etc. By visiting these patients regularly and identifying and working to correct these obstacles before they rise to the level of an ER visit, we can successfully guide them to the best, most appropriate resource, and thereby avoid significant costs of care. Patients can be cared for at home or can be scheduled at their primary care provider before needing the ER. Often, simply having the knowledge that someone is coming to visit them and provide a review and assurance of the current health status is enough to avoid an unnecessary ER visit. The list of similar situations is a long one, however the overriding goal is to identify and correct problems before they rise to the level of a necessary ER visit or produce an unnecessary visit or transport.

Improvements in health and cost-savings may be realized by patients to the ER as appropriate before letting a problem grow to the extent that it would require a more costly admission. Similarly, in consultation with their treating physician, or in concert with a pre-determined protocol, it is possible for medications to be provided or to be modified, thus improving the patient's condition, and avoiding unscheduled visits to the ER or clinic setting.



This program would use our limited existing resources strategically to reduce growing barriers and address key health needs.


Current Situation and Overview


Community Care Paramedics (CCPs) assist communities through responsive and patient-centered approach to a growing problem—that of increasing medical costs, aging populations, and increased use of Emergency Responders for non-urgent situations. CCPs can manage chronic health conditions, prevent acute conditions from getting worse, and stop an illness before it can even begin by educating on preventive measures. As described by *EMS World*, a community paramedic engages the patient and helps them understand how best to manage their disease. This includes education about symptoms, lifestyle modifications, warning signs for worsening health, and proper use of medication or equipment. The patient also works with the community paramedic to practice their self-monitoring and disease management techniques and allows sufficient time for the paramedic to educate and check for full understanding.


CCP programs address a medical provider shortage and Marathon County need. Communities, like ours, are responding to the healthcare crisis with new and innovative delivery models such as CCP to stretch limited primary care resources. According to the American Academy of Family Physicians, the number of medical school students going into primary care has dropped 51.8 percent since 1997. According to the Wall Street Journal, the US is short about 16,000 primary care physicians nationally, especially in rural areas.


The number of falls-related EMS calls for Marathon County residents over the age of 60 is trending upward as well. In 2023, Marathon County EMS fielded over 2,383 calls due to falls. Many falls are preventable, and can be addressed in the home, between a CCP and the patient.




















Background

A certified paramedic is the highest level of an emergency medical technician, trained to provide advanced life support and other technical medical procedures. While traditionally educated in the emergency response realm, a paramedic's scope of practice can also include the provision of certain primary medical services, with oversight by a physician or other advanced-practice provider. CCPs can also provide outreach and education to patients, including education on falls prevention measures, how to use medical equipment, and risk reduction.

Community Paramedicine Models for Prevention and Health EducationPrevention and health education represent one significant role for community paramedics in the healthcare system. Through home visits and regular check-ins, community paramedics can identify medication errors, environmental risks, or problems with durable medical equipment that are not often identified in a traditional clinical or healthcare setting.

People with complex chronic conditions often have many prescriptions, each with their own dosing schedules, warnings, and instructions. This complexity can <u>make it challenging for patients to take their medication safely and correctly</u> each day (https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC3968427/). In addition, because these prescriptions often come from multiple providers, patients may not have support managing their medication lists. There may be contraindications, errors in dosage, drug type, or patient usage, resulting in <u>adverse drug events</u> that can be harmful or even fatal (https://www.cdc.gov/medicationsafety/basics.html).

Medication Management

One important role for community paramedics is to help patients manage medications. Community

paramedics can help set up reminders, explain dosing instructions, identify medication management issues like improper storage, and uncover errors in their medication list. CCPs can help patients develop a comprehensive list of their current prescriptions. Once the list is correct, the community paramedic confirms its contents with the patient's providers, ensuring that all dosages are correct, and all medications are still currently needed to manage their health. The community paramedic can work with the patient and their family or caregiver to ensure they understand how and when to take each medication, along with any potential warning signs of adverse drug events that should be shared with their primary care provider.

Safety Assessments

Community paramedics conducting home visits are well-positioned to observe any issues in the patient's home that may pose safety risks. Particularly for elderly or frail patients, tripping hazards like throw rugs, broken stairs, ill-fitting slippers, or electrical cords may pose a risk for falls. Home safety checks can help identify modifications that make it easier and safer for patients to age in place, including installing grab bars, adequate lighting, and non-slip surfaces. By identifying these issues early, community paramedics can prevent accidents that may later result in a 911 call or emergency room visit.

Medical Equipment

Community paramedicine programs can also conduct safety checks of home durable medical equipment like nebulizers, wheelchairs, or continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machines.

Local Data

An analysis funded by the HHS Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response indicates that approximately 15 percent of Medicare patients transported to the ED by ambulance can be safely cared for in other settings if available in a community. National models suggest that if these patients were transported to a physician's office, Medicare could save \$559.871 million per year and if they were treated at home, it is expected the savings would be significantly higher. Cost data for Medicaid are not available but expected to be even greater. In 2006, Medicare and Medicaid paid 20 percent and 21 percent respectively of ED charges.

Wait times on ER

Strategy

As the nation faces the possibility of increasing healthcare costs, there is significant opportunity for EMS systems to be part of the solution and help reduce the incidence of costly care for Marathon County patients. CCP could reduce downstream emergency department and hospitalization costs while increasing

patient care quality and safety by changing their service delivery. CCP could triage of patients calling 911 without dispatch of an ambulance, treat patients without transport, transport patients to a clinic or other provider for an unscheduled visit, for example.

The Community Paramedic model increases the availability of preventative services, and as a result, is expected to have the following outcomes:

- Increased care coordination
- Decrease in injuries including falls
- Reduced emergency department visits
- Reduced hospital readmissions
- Increased referrals to community services
- Decrease overall healthcare costs
- Better community health outcomes through preventive care that impacts communicable and chronic diseases

Other examples include:

- Manatee County Department of Public Safety Community Health Program (formerly the Community Paramedicine), funded by local tax dollars, serves frequent emergency service utilizers and patients who have diabetes, respiratory conditions, and substance use disorder, as well as people experiencing frequent falls. Initially only serving patients with diabetes, the program added a new patient population to its program every 60 days, taking a year to roll out its full capacity and reach. Patients are referred to the program through a variety of methods: paramedics use their 911 call database to identify eligible patients; paramedics refer patients through their documentation platform; and primary care providers, hospital staff members, churches, and social groups may refer patients to the program. Patients may remain in the program for a maximum of 90 days. On average, patients spend 65-68 days in the program. To graduate from the program, patients must meet the health goals set by the community paramedics, be aligned with a primary care provider, and have not used the pre-hospital system or had an unplanned hospital visit in the last 30 days. If necessary, the program provides patients with medical supplies, like walkers and wheelchairs, from its medical supply lending closet. The program uses an electronic healthcare coordination platform developed for EMS providers, which allows the community paramedics to document their interactions with each patient and review documentation from pharmacists, social workers, and other providers. Program leadership meet quarterly with emergency medical service groups and state leadership to share ideas, success stories, and challenges in treating their patient population
- ThedaCare and Gold Cross Ambulance in northeastern Wisconsin have partnered to develop a community paramedicine program that serves a variety of patients referred from hospital and primary care settings. Through funding from the Moore Foundation's Community Management of Medication Complexity Innovation Lab, the team was able to expand its program to focus on patients whose complex prescription regimens put them at increased risk of hospitalization. By developing a Medication Risk Score, community paramedics were better able to assess which patients needed extra support to improve their health. The criteria for who is served through ThedaCare's community paramedicine program evolved over the course of the pilot. Initially, patients had to have made three or more visits to the ED in six months, or six or more over the

course of a year to participate. Eventually, primary care physicians also began referring patients about whom they had serious concerns, i.e., a patient who was not taking her prescribed medications correctly; a patient who had multiple clinic and specialist visits, yet still seemed confused about managing her health; or a patient whose adult children called multiple times with concerns about their parent.

- Tri-County Health Care EMS in Wadena, Minnesota, provides home visits to patients at high risk of readmissions and works with clients who are frequent emergency medical service users (http://naemt.org/docs/default-source/community-paramedicine/Toolkit/tricounty-case-study-1.pdf). The program also receives referrals from providers who have identified patients needing additional support obtaining health resources. Every two weeks, program clients receive a visit from a multi-disciplinary team that includes a social worker, who is able to further tailor their care plan or make additional referrals as needed.

Noting the presence of a quorum Chairperson Rasmussen called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

<u>Discussion and Possible action regarding ARPA funding requests and related budget modification for</u> addition of two officers to Wausau Police Department authorized staffing level.

Rasmussen questioned if it was a plan to pair these additional officers with the Community Resource Coordinator. It was stated that these additional officers would be informed of the services that the Community Resource Coordinator provides but that it would be a one-way referral. The core function of the officers would be to enforce city ordinances and state law in accordance with the standards of conduct expected in this community.

Watson questioned what the main tasks of these additional officers would be as it was stated that while enforcement was a core function, citations were not expected to aid in carrying out that enforcement. Watson stated support of hiring additional Community Resource Coordinators. It was stated that there is a difference in the work the Community Resource Coordinator does and the additional officers. The additional officers will patrol parks, parking ramps, and the downtown business area where unhoused individuals often are located to deter certain behaviors. Watson further questioned if there were certain experiences and training which would be required for officers hired for these additional positions. It was stated that AODA, mental health, and housing knowledge would be desired, but the main qualification would be creative problem solving and empathy in character.

Rasmussen stated value in gathering data in where there are deficiencies in our system to prevent individuals from becoming unhoused in our community and to identify solutions with that information. Rasmussen stated that there must be a connection to resources, a care element, and enforcement of ordinances to curb this issue.

Lukens questioned if the current unhoused population is having their safety threatened by an increase of additional unhoused individuals. It was stated that unhoused female identifying individuals experience an unproportional rate of victimization while the gap between shelter and permanent housing exists for all unhoused individuals.

Diny questioned if the position posting has been finalized. It was stated that this was an ongoing conversation between the Police Department and the Human Resources Department. The job description will include the ability to work flexible hours and expectations of community outreach within the unhoused population and area. Diny further questioned if ARPA was an appropriate funding source as it is one-time funding for ongoing positions.

Rasmussen stated that this will be scored for ARPA funding at the next Finance Committee meeting. It was additionally stated that future budget pressure was a factor when the committee scores this item for ARPA funding.
