Greetings Wausau!

At the beginning of December, the Wausau Water Works Commission learned that Wausau's water rates would be going up more than we anticipated. I've had a lot of folks contacting me asking me why this wasn't planned for and what accounts for the proposed rate increase.

The rate increase was planned for - though today's proposed increase is more than 2019's proposed increase. Initially in 2019, the Wausau Water Works Commission and the Wausau City Council planned for a 45% rate increase to cover the debt on the cost of construction of the new facility along with the estimated increased operations and maintenance costs; a lot has happened since 2019.

The general operation costs have increased, there has been significant construction cost increases for future capital projects, and we also needed to find a solution for removing PFAS from the drinking water. All of these have contributed to a higher-than-expected rate increase. All the information has been submitted to the Wisconsin Public Service Commission (PSC) for their review and determination of an adjusted water rate for 2023. The PSC will schedule a public hearing in the next month or so and we expect the PSC to implement the rates by June 2023.

The good news is that our temporary solution to addressing PFAS in the new plant is currently removing to non-detect levels. The temporary solution is using a combination of anion exchange and with PFAS attracting resin. The reason that's our temporary solution and not our permanent solution is because each time we need to change out the resin, it's about \$800,000. We think the resin will last about a year, but the utility team will continue monitoring and testing for breakthrough. During the next year, we hope to get the permanent solution to PFAS removal in place, a lead lag granular activated carbon (we call this GAC) system.

I've heard from some folks that they are concerned about the affordability of their water. According to the City's financial planner Ehlers, the average family is looking at an increase of about \$200 a year. In the Wausau Water Works section of this newsletter, we have information on three programs to help folks who need assistance paying their water bills.

The Utility team and I are continuing to look for grant opportunities, state and federal money, and other opportunities outside of rates to fund construction and operations that will assist in funding future capital projects allow us to provide safe drinking water to our community and minimize the potential for future rate increases.

I understand that nobody likes to hear this kind of news but I am hopeful that we are doing the right things for generations to come by future-proofing the Drinking Water Treatment Facility and providing great water for residents.

Thank you for being a part of Wausau.

Winter Storms

Severe winter weather can bring a wide range of threats with it, including heavy snow, ice, and frigid cold temperatures. Preparation and good decision making are critical to staying safe when winter weather strikes.

Know the Terms

Freezing Rain

Rain that freezes when it hits the ground, creating a coating of ice on roads, walkways, trees, and power lines.

Sleet

Rain that turns to ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet also causes moisture on roads to freeze and become slippery.

Winter Storm Watch

A winter storm is possible in your area. Tune in to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for more information.

Winter Storm Warning

A winter storm is occurring or will soon occur in your area.

Blizzard Warning

Sustained winds or frequent gusts to 35 miles per hour or greater and considerable amounts of falling or blowing snow (reducing visibility to less than a quarter mile) are expected to prevail for a period of three hours or longer.

Frost/Freeze Warning

Below freezing temperatures are expected.

Frostbite

Damage to body tissue caused by extreme cold. A wind chill of -20 Fahrenheit could cause frostbite in just 15 minutes or less. Frostbite causes a loss of feeling and a white or pale appearance in extremities such as fingers, toes, ear tips or the tip of the nose. If symptoms are detected - Seek medical care immediately!

Hypothermia

A condition that develops when the body temperature drops below 95 Fahrenheit. It is very deadly. Warning signs include uncontrollable shivering, disorientation, slurred speech and drowsiness. Seek medical care immediately!

Winter Season Vehicle Checklist

Check or have a mechanic check the following items on your car:


- Antifreeze levels - ensure they are sufficient to avoid freezing.
- Battery and ignition system - should be in top condition and battery terminals should be clean.
- Brakes - check for wear and fluid levels.

- Exhaust system - check for leaks and crimped pipes and repair or replace as necessary. Carbon monoxide is deadly and usually gives no warning.
- Fuel and air filters - replace and keep water out of the system by using additives and maintaining a full tank of gas.
- Heater and defroster - ensure they work properly.
- Lights and flashing hazard lights - check for serviceability.
- Oil - check for level and weight. Heavier oils congeal more at low temperatures and do not lubricate as well.
- Thermostat - ensure it works properly.
- Windshield wiper equipment - repair any problems and maintain proper washer fluid level.
- Winter Tires - make sure the tires have adequate tread.
- Maintain at least a half tank of gas during the winter season.

**After the Winter Storm:
POWER OUTAGE**

- Be careful with heat sources**
Candles and space heaters are a fire risk. Also stay warm by bundling up and keeping doors closed, placing towels in cracks.
- Practice portable generator safety**
Use outdoors, at least 20 feet away from doors/windows/garages to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. Follow instructions on proper use.
- Check on neighbors**
Once your family is safe, check on your neighbors and the vulnerable to make sure they are OK.

Overnight Parking

ALL NIGHT PARKING: Parking is allowed on City streets (other than in designated areas in downtown—see below) on an alternate side basis **during the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.** It is not necessary to call the Police Department for permission. Vehicles must be parked on the even-numbered side of the street on even-numbered calendar days and on the odd side of the street on odd-numbered calendar days.

Odd/even parking is not allowed on streets where “No Parking” restrictions are in effect. However, odd/even parking is not enforced on streets with “No Parking” on one side of the street only. Therefore, residents can legally park on the side not prohibitively posted regardless of the day unless a snow emergency has been declared.

Keep in mind that the odd/even requirement pertains to the time period of 2:30 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. If you park your vehicle on the street in the evening intending that it will be parked overnight, make sure it is on the appropriate odd/even-numbered side of the street for the time period of 2:30 a.m. to 6:00 a.m.

DOWNTOWN AREA: Between the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m., parking is not allowed in the area (including both sides of the streets) bounded on the north by McIndoe Street, on the west by First Street, on the south by Forest Street, and on the east by Sixth Street. Persons who live downtown (and occasional visitors) can park overnight in the parking ramp structures. However, your vehicle must be removed from the parking structure before 8:00 a.m., Monday through Friday, to avoid being ticketed.

SNOW EMERGENCY: Overnight parking will not be allowed during snow emergencies. Residents should keep in mind that even if a snow emergency has not been declared, vehicles which are parked overnight on City streets during snowfalls may hinder snow plowing operations.

The forfeiture for violating the overnight parking ordinance is \$25.00, and is \$100.00 during snow emergencies.

Our crews respond as fast as they can. While crews are working, please avoid the area and give them room to work. Our equipment is big and needs room to operate and ensure a safe work site for our employees.



RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT

Motor homes, camping and travel trailers, boats, trailers, snowmobiles, ATV's, etc. cannot be parked or stored in any required front yard or corner side yard, except for on a designated driveway which meets the City's hard-surfacing requirements.

Equipment or trailers that are longer than 30' (measured from back bumper to tongue) must be parked within enclosed structures.

Sump Pump Drainage Requirements:

Winter maintenance is a property owner responsibility, including maintaining sidewalks. In order to prevent ice build-ups, no flowage from sump pumps is allowed onto sidewalks or streets. Please refer to the code requirements below.

WMC 19.44.080 - Sump pumps.

All sump pumps installed for the purpose of discharging clear waters from foundation drains and ground infiltration and where the building is not serviced by gravity shall either discharge into an underground conduit leading to a drainage ditch, gutter, dry well, or shall discharge onto the ground at least one foot or more out from the building and above permanent grade in such manner as not to create a nuisance. No sump discharge shall be allowed to flow on or across a public sidewalk.

2023 Wausau Recycling Collection

Please refer to the table and calendar to determine your recycling and garbage pick-up day. If you have any questions as to whether you live in a blue or yellow collection area, call City Hall at 715-261-6500.

Recycling carts should be set out with garbage containers between the hours of 3:00 pm the day prior to collection day and should be removed from the curbside area by 11:00 a.m. the day after pick-up. Recycling containers have a green lid and Garbage containers have a blue lid. Garbage pick-up is every week and Recycling cart pick-up is every other week. Placement of the carts at the curbside need to be placed at least 4 feet from other objects such as other carts, mailboxes and trees to accommodate the mechanical arm as it grips the cart and empties its contents. Thank you! **Keep this schedule for future reference and remember the holiday schedule of a "day delay" pick-up.**







Don't Illegally Serve Alcohol!

Around the holidays, businesses want to provide alcohol beverages to the public. Sometimes alcohol beverages are given for free to potential customers (e.g. men's night at the jewelry store and everyone gets a free beer while they shop), or they are given to paying customers (e.g. every adult admission pass purchase comes with a free glass of wine). Whether or not these are given away, or they are sold as part of the sale price of a product or service, these activities are illegal unless the appropriate retail alcohol beverage license is held by the business.

- No Class "B" beer license may be granted for any premises where any other business is conducted in connection with the premise. This includes jewelry stores, hair salons/spas, credit unions, banks, etc.
 - o These restrictions do not apply to hotels, restaurants, clubs, movie theaters, painting studios and others.

Wisconsin law requires the sale of alcohol beverages be made face-to-face at a physical licensed premise. Individuals may not purchase alcohol beverages for delivery to their residence (except wine from a direct wine shipper). There are no exceptions for fermented malt beverages (beer) or intoxicating liquor other than wine (spirits).

Celebrate the season and recognize your loyal customers and loved ones -- but do it legally.

Group Workcamps Program

**Wausau Group Workcamps:
July 23-29, 2023**

As the winter blues set in, do you or a neighbor need some assistance in making some repairs to your home? The City of Wausau has an opportunity get you that assistance at no cost. That's right, free help!

Through a collaboration with Group Mission Trips, the City of Wausau will be hosting a local mission trip experience right here in the City next summer, July 23-29, 2023. Every summer, Group Mission Trips hosts "Workcamp" locations across the country for youth and adults to come together in the spirit of service to do home repair work for those in need. All the activities will be hosted and headquartered at Horace Mann Middle School in Wausau.

At Group Workcamps, hundreds of teenagers from faith based youth groups across the country repair and transform homes. Home repair mission trips are large-sized gatherings with up to 400 teenage and adult chaperone participants who focus specifically on residential home repair with the aid of professional adult volunteers. Typically, they work on 50-70 homes during a one-week camp.

The types of home repair projects range from painting, building decks and wheelchair ramps, and other general home repairs. Both labor and materials are free to qualifying households.

To learn how your home might be included, please complete the application found on the City website (www.wausaudevelopment.com/GroupWorkcamps.aspx) or stop by the Community Development Department at City Hall to pick one up. This applications can be returned to the below address where it will be reviewed and considered for the program. Groupworks will only be able to work on a limited number of home sites as part of the program. Preference will be given to those qualified applicants that submit their applications in a timely manner. Applications are currently being accepted, with final review occurring in the spring of 2023. Your house must be in the City of Wausau to participate.

Newcomer's Corner

If you are new to Wausau, here are some things that are handy to know, before you learn the hard way...

- Wausau has a limit of 2 dogs and/or 3 cats per household. A permit can be obtained if you have more. All cats and dogs must be licensed. Chickens can be kept with a permit.
- Building permits are required for most home improvements—call before you start a project!
- Garbage and recycling pick up is included in the property taxes. All residences are issued bins. Consult the schedule on our website to find out your pick up day.
- Backyard fires are allowed only by permit, which can be applied for at City Hall.
- Overnight parking follows an even/odd date schedule all year long. See the police dept section for details.
- Sidewalks need to be cleared of snow and ice withing 24 hours. There are blue barrels for sand throughout the city that you can help yourself to for your slippery sidewalks. Snow is not to be shoveled into the street.
- During a major snowfall, a snow emergency may be declared, which means absolutely no parking on the street, even if you don't have driveway space.
- Water bills are sent quarterly, so it can take some time to get your first one (homeowners.)
- There is a curfew for those under the age of 16 between midnight and 6 am.
- You can view city meetings on our public access station, and on YouTube.
