## 2016 Leaf Collection Schedule

This schedule is subject to change depending on the weather.

Please DO NOT rake leaves into the gutter until the weekend before your scheduled collection date. The leaves may wash into the storm sewer, clogging inlets and sewer pipes. Also, the additional amount of leaves traveling through the storm sewers add to the amount of leaves in the river, thereby creating an undesirable effect on the environment by increasing the organic matter in the river. PLEASE COOPERATE!

Residents wishing to dispose of leaves prior to their collection date may deposit leaves at the yard waste site at 105 East Chellis Street. Leaves should not be raked into gutters after the scheduled collection date. After the scheduled date all remaining leaves should be taken to the yard waste site for disposal.

The yard waste site will close at 5:00 PM on Sunday, November 20, 2016.

Individuals or groups with trucks or trailers are needed to pick up bagged leaves and haul them to area yard waste sites both on and after Make A Difference Day. Times are flexible. Volunteer must provide own truck and/or trailer for hauling leaves. A valid driver's license is required. Small gas card provided.
- **Fill A Food Pantry.** Non-perishable food items donated to the Marathon County Hunger Coalition.
- Coats for Kids. New or gently used outerwear for kids to adults collected by the Kiwanis.
- Toiletries Drive. Personal care items for men, women and children donated to Workplace Volunteer Council's Back to Basics project.

All projects take place October 22 at the Wausau National Guard Armory, 833 S. 17th Ave., Wausau. Drop off food, clothing, and toiletry donations from 8 AM-Noon. Leaf rakers and leaf haulers should report to the armory between 8-9 AM to pick up raking assignments.

#### September 10 - November 27, 2016 Birds in Art

Long venerated for embodying freedom, grace, and beauty in flight, birds continually provide creative inspiration to exceed limits of earthbound human existence. As we aspire to sing, soar, and preen like them adorned in brilliant attire, avian art inspires in endless ways. When talented artists from throughout the world strive to be among those chosen for the internationally renowned Birds in Art exhibition, the resulting depictions are breathtaking. The 41st annual exhibition celebrates avian marvels through fresh interpretations in original paintings, sculptures, and graphics created within the last three years.

## December 3, 2016 - February 26, 2017 **Tiffany Glass: Painting with Color and Light**

Tiffany Studios' leaded-glass lampshades and windows, designed with colorfully luminous opalescent glass, shine as some of the twentieth century's most striking, iconic decorative objects.

### On View in the Sculpture Garden & Grounds

The Museum's grounds feature sculptures that delight visitors of all ages. From Deborah Butterfield's Kua to Burt Brent's The Heavyweight, a range of artistic styles and wonders of the natural world can be found. Another highlight is Kent Ullberg's striking bronze whooping cranes that stand as iconic sentinels at the garden's entrance. Experience sculpture by following handicapped-accessible pathways throughout the sculpture garden, near the pond area, and to the Secret Garden.

### The Dance by The Myth Makers On the Grounds Site-specific sculpture created June 21-25, 2016

A nearly thirty-foot-tall sculpture of a sandhill crane pair made from Wausau-area saplings, The Dance was created by Boston artists Donna Dodson and Andy Moerlein, known as The Myth Makers, as a site-specific sculpture from ephemeral materials. Inspired by the way the seasonal migration of sandhill cranes to their Wisconsin nesting grounds marks the passage of time, the artists designed The Dance to be "awe-inspiring, imaginative, and playful."

## ATTENTION ELECTORS...



**STATE IT** - As always, you'll need to state your full name and address for the election official who checks you in at the poll site or the clerk's office. They'll check your information in the poll book. Some people are uneasy about announcing their name in public, but it is the law, and it helps ensure openness in elections.

**SHOW IT-** Next, it's time to show your photo ID. The poll workers will compare your face to your photo and confirm that you really are you.

**SIGN IT** - You'll sign the poll book (unless prevents due to a physical disability). Your signature or mark should go right next to your name and address. Now you are ready to vote!

#### IS MY VOTER REGISTRATION UP TO DATE?

Registering to vote and/or updating your voter information PRIOR to Election Day will speed up the process for you and your fellow voters. You may register with the Clerk/Customer Service Office at City Hall (407 Grant Street) Monday through Friday 8:00 am - 4:30 pm. Don't forget to bring proof of residency. To check the accuracy of your voter registration, go to "My Vote Wisconsin" website at http://myvote.wi.gov. This site also has valuable information such as poll site location and what is on the ballot. Check it out!

#### WHEN WILL BALLOTS BE AVAILABLE

Are you traveling to a warmer climate or want to beat the long lines on Election Day? You may request an absentee ballot. You can download the absentee request form from the City's website at http://www.ci.wausau.wi.us/Services/ Elections or send a signed letter requesting a ballot to be mailed to you. Don't forget to include a copy of your Photo ID. You may also vote in-person at City Hall during early voting: September 23, 2016 through November 4, 2016.

## UNWILLING OR UNABLE TO VOTE AT A POLL SITE DUE TO AGE, ILLNESS, OR DISABILITY?

You may sign an authorization form (download an absentee request form at http://www.ci.wausau.wi.us/Services/Elections) or send a signed letter requesting permanent status. Once you are signed up, an absentee ballot will be mailed to you for every election and you will remain on the permanent list as long as you continue to return a ballot. An indefinitely confined voter does not need to provide a copy of photo ID. Instead, the witness' signature and address on the Absentee Ballot Certificate Envelope in which you return your

voted ballot to the municipal clerk, satisfies the photo ID requirement.

## COMMON ABSENTEE BALLOTING ERRORS

Please take an extra moment to make sure the following requirements have been met so that your absentee vote counts: 1) The name and address on the envelope label is your current name and residence for voting purposes. If the information is not correct - do not write over it, you must reregister at the new address to have a new ballot issued. 2) Make sure you have signed the absentee ballot envelope. 3) Make sure a witness has signed and listed their address on the absentee ballot envelope indicating they witnessed that you were the person who cast the ballot.

## BECOME INVOLVED IN THE ELECTION PROCESS

Want to spend a rewarding day and serve your country? Sign up to be a poll worker! Citizen involvement ensures open, accurate and fair elections. Job duties include: greeter, registering new voters, poll list check in, ballot issuance and managing ballot counter. Job requirements: good with people, detail oriented, good penmanship, ability to sit or stand for long periods of time, willing to work in any one of the polling sites located within the City of Wausau. All day and half day shifts are available. Training is provided. Applications are available in the clerk's office or online at: http://www.ci.wausau.wi.us/Services/ Elections/Resources.aspx.

Election Day is TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2016. Please exercise your right to vote!

## Water Works Department News

#### What is a Cross Connection?

A cross connection is an actual or potential connection between a safe drinking water (potable) supply and a source of contamination or pollution. State plumbing codes require approved backflow prevention methods to be installed at every point of potable water connection and use.

#### Do

- ✓ install hose bibb vacuum breakers on threaded faucest around you home
- ✓ keep the ends of hoses clear of contaminants

#### Do Not

- ✓ use spray attachments without a vacuum breaker
- ✓ submerge hose in buckets, tubs, sinks or pools

## Wausau Water to Issue Delinquent Notices

Notices for delinquent water and sewer bills will be issued in early October to property owners and also to tenants. These bills are due by November 1, 2016 to avoid an additional 10% penalty. If not paid by November 15, the total owing, including the 10% penalty, will be added to the property taxes. Recent changes in the law now states that these charges may also show up in the Circuit Court Access Program (CCAP) program under the tenant's name. This could have a bearing for tenants who are looking at renting other properties and have delinguent water and sewer bills as potential landlords would be able to see that information. ## Wausau Fire Accreditation Process Underway

At the end of August, Wausau Firefighters began conducting hazard risk assessments and pre-incident planning throughout the City of Wausau. The risk assessment is a tool that allows the fire department to determine levels of risk in the city. The assessment focuses on different criteria dealing with types of building and truss construction, safety systems in the building, size of the building, number of people in the building, and other unique hazards in the building. Data collected in the risk assessment will be used as part of the fire department's accreditation process which will help direct the fire department and the city when making critical decisions like staffing of personnel and locations of fire stations.

In addition to the hazard risk assessment, the Wausau Fire Department is also collecting information for pre-incident plans. Pre-incident plans contain vital information for firefighters such as gas and electrical shutoffs, Knox Box locations, areas of rescue assistance, stairwells, and more. This information can then be used by the Incident Commander if there is ever an emergency in the building. This data is collected at the same time as the hazard risk assessment.

There are many similarities between a risk assessment, a pre-incident plan, and a routine fire inspection. Like a fire inspection, Wausau Fire Department personnel make contact with building owners and/or occupants to gather the critical information needed to generate an accurate risk assessment or pre-incident plan. Also, like a routine fire inspection, there are no associated costs for these services. When occupants and/or owners answer questions about the building and potentially guide them through the building, they assist WFD personnel in gathering information that is accurate. This is important for risk assessments, pre-incident plans, and fire inspections. The biggest difference between the three functions is when a fire inspection is conducted; it could lead to further action being required by the owner and/or occupant to make the property compliant with the fire code. Also, fire inspections are typically conducted on a more routine basis, most often twice a year in most public buildings, whereas, the risk assessments and pre-incident plans are conducted on an as needed basis.

What does all this mean for the Wausau community? Specifically for the accreditation process, the risk assessment data is plotted into a Global Information System (GIS) that will allow the department to map the hazards throughout the city and plan accordingly based on that information. Overall, the data collected from the risk assessment and pre-fire planning will ultimately aid and direct the Wausau Fire Department in their mission "to provide rapid, professional emergency services to protect and enhance our community."



## **Emerald Ash Borer or (EAB)**

The City of Wausau has been working on a plan to mitigate the impact of EAB to the City of Wausau Street Tree population.

EAB is an imported insect (not a disease) that was first detected in 2002 in the Detroit, Michigan area. It was probably imported to the United States in pallet or crating material.

The adult beetles which are metallic green in color lay eggs which subsequently hatch and the larvae burrow under the bark of native ash trees. The larvae stage burrowing process which is just under the bark disrupts the trees food and water conducting tissue which causes the trees to die. All native ash trees are susceptible to EAB. Mountain ash are not true ash trees and are not affected. Depending on the rate of infestation and health of the trees at the time of attack it takes anywhere from 2-5 years to kill an ash tree.

The planning process to deal with EAB actually started in 2004 when the City quit planting ash trees along streets and in parks. As Federal and State agencies became more involved and more information became available about the insect further steps were taken. In 2007 an ash inventory of all City street trees was completed to determine how many and where street tree ash were located. This information was stored on a computer database. In 2011 an EAB Management Plan was written based on at that time current guidelines and recommendations from Federal and State Agencies along with communities that had been dealing with EAB for several years. During this time based on recommendations the City began removing and replacing ash trees as time and resources allowed.

As EAB moved closer to the Wausau area City and County officials were updated on the steps that were being taken and further action that was needed. With the confirmation of EAB in Stevens Pint this past spring it became obvious that further steps needed to be implemented. A plan was passed by the City Park Committee that would allow the management of this pest in as controlled a manner as possible with as little disruption of City services as possible.

At the present time funding requests are being considered by City Council to chemically treat 70% of the ash street trees and remove 30% of the ash street trees. A Citywide computer inventory was completed this summer and the inventory will help determine which trees will be treated and those that will be removed. Removals will target trees that are in poor condition or growing in undesirable locations. This process will be spread over a seven year time span.

Chemical treatment and removals will be for street trees only. Many ash in the City are on private property and will need to be managed by individual property owners. Property owners need to assess the value of the ash trees on their property to determine if they are worth investing time, effort and money to treat. Considerations would be health of the tree and location on the property among other factors. Chemicals are available that allow homeowners to treat trees themselves and links have been included to help determine individual preferences and needs. Private contractors are available to treat homeowner's trees. Homeowners would be wise to use qualified licensed landscape or tree service companies and choose companies that will provide proof of insurance. If multiple trees are to be treated the cost will be higher than an individual tree. Getting multiple bids would be prudent as costs will vary. Qualified companies should be able to answer questions on treatment options, provide information based on research and help homeowners decide which trees are good candidates for treatment.

Pet licenses are required for all dogs and cats more than four months of age on January 1 of any year, or four months of age within the license year, regardless of whether or not your pet goes outside.

Proof of rabies vaccination, expiration date and proof of spayed or neutered is required at the time of licensing.

There is an \$8.00 discount on each license if your pet is microchipped, proof is required.

The license can be obtained in a variety of ways:

- In person at the Customer Service Counter, please bring the necessary proof of spayed or neutering, microchipping and rabies vaccination.
- Or mail a payment along with required documents to City Hall 407 Grant Street, Wausau, WI 54403
- You can also pay and upload the required documents online and process the application electronically at https://evolveportal. ci.wausau.wi.us/.

Licensing fees for 2017 licensing year are: an unaltered dog or cat is \$60.00 per year; an altered dog or cat is \$18.00 per year. All pets are given an \$8.00 discount if they are microchipped. Proof of microchipping is required for discount.

To prevent a late fee, all dog and cat licenses are due no later than March 31st of every year. A late fee of double the regular license fee, in addition to the required license fee is imposed if the license is obtained after March 31st. The forfeiture for NOT having a current pet license is \$187.00.



## Odd/Even Overnight Parking

Are you confused on what side of the street to park on during the overnight hours? Have you received an overnight parking ticket and wondered why you received it? The following information should clarify the rules for overnight parking in the City of Wausau.

All Night Parking: Parking is allowed on City streets (other than in designated areas in downtown—see below) on an alternate side basis during the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. It is not necessary to call the Police Department for permission. Vehicles must be parked on the even-numbered side of the street on even-numbered calendar days and on the odd side of the street on odd-numbered calendar days. Odd/ even parking is not allowed on streets where "No Parking" restrictions are in effect. However, odd/even parking is not enforced on streets with "No Parking" on one side of the street only. Therefore, residents can legally park on the side not prohibitively posted regardless of the day unless a snow emergency has been declared.

Keep in mind the odd/even requirement pertains to the time period of 2:30 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. If you park your vehicle on the street in the evening intending that it will be parked overnight, make sure it is on the appropriate odd/even-numbered side of the street for the time period of 2:30 am to 6:00 am.

**Downtown Area:** Parking is not be allowed in the area (including both sides of the streets) bounded on the north by McIndoe Street, on the west by First Street, on the south by Forest Street, and on the east by Sixth Street. Persons who live downtown (and occasional visitors) can contact the Clerk/Customer Service Office (phone 715- 261-6620) to purchase monthly overnight permits to park in a City parking facility.

**Snow Emergency:** Overnight parking will not be allowed during snow emergencies. Residents should keep in mind that even if a snow emergency has not been declared, vehicles which are parked overnight on City streets during snowfalls may hinder snow plowing operations.

The forfeiture for violating the overnight parking ordinance is \$25.00, and is \$100.00 during snow emergencies.
