Mayor's Message

Greetings to the Residents of Wausau!

This is the last newsletter for 2017. It is full of useful information. so please save it, as we move into the winter months.

The fall season is upon us and that means it is budget time for the city. Earlier this summer, Department heads submitted their 2018 budgets and goals. As of this printing, the city of Wausau, like all communities in the state of Wisconsin, are still waiting for the results of what state aids will be available to the city of Wausau through the "shared revenue" process. Other than that issue, the overall budget process has been going



extremely well. Once again, I have stressed to all city staff the importance of keeping their expenses in check, while providing the quality of service that taxpayers want and expect. The budget is always a "challenge" due to less revenue given back to the city from the state and federal governments, the continuing rise in costs for health insurance, utilities and employee cost of living increases, as well as the everincreasing demand for increased city services. Yet we always seem to be able to do more with less revenue and we have also been and will always be, committed to ensuring that money received from taxpayers is spent in a responsible and reasonable manner.

The Fall Leaf Pick-up has a "window" that is scheduled to start the last week of October, then going into the first two weeks of November. Because of the continuous weather changes, these dates are subject to change and if they do, we will get the message out about those changes so that residents can plan accordingly.

The Phase #1 of the Thomas Street project is moving along and is on schedule to be completed by early November. For the Phase # 2 part of the project, I directed that new soil boring tests be conducted in different areas of the Phase # 2 project and at the time of this publication, those results are yet unknown. Those results will be brought forward to the Capital Improvements and Street Maintenance Committee and then to the entire City Council for their review. We will then proceed to move forward with just the street design during the winter season, before any further construction continues for Phase #2.

On September 20th, we held our annual city Employee Appreciation Picnic to recognize our long term and recent retired employees. The dedication, professionalism, caring and hard-working attitude of our city employees is truly appreciated. I am grateful and impressed that they serve all of us in the manner that they do. To all of our city employees, I send a heartfelt and sincere "THANK YOU" for making Wausau the great city it is!

I'm pleased to share more positive Economic Development news. The East Riverfront Development continues to expand and grow! Starting this month of October, the Riverlife Village will start to take shape. There will be new construction of an apartment complex and a commercial mixed-use space with a completion date of 2019. An illumination event was held in August and a beautiful photo inside showcases the lighting along the pedestrian bridge, wharf area and River Drive waterfall area. 2017 Leaf Collection Schedule

Please <u>DO NOT</u> rake leaves into the gutter until the weekend before your scheduled collection date. The leaves may wash into the storm sewer, clogging inlets and sewer pipes. Also, the additional amounts of leaves traveling through the storm sewers add to the amount of leaves in the river, thereby creating an undesirable effect on the environment by increasing the organic matter in the river.

PLEASE COOPERATE!

Residents wishing to dispose of leaves prior to their collection date may deposit leaves at the yard waste site at 105 East Chellis Street. Leaves should not be raked into gutters after the scheduled collection date. After the scheduled date all remaining leaves should be taken to the yard waste site for disposal.


The yard waste site will close at 5:00 PM on Sunday, NOVEMBER 19, 2017.

Falls Tappers Compete at National Competition

Wausau's Bull Falls Tappers attended the American Water Works Association Annual Conference & Exposition in June. They competed with teams from across the country as well as Canada and Mexico. Each team had a chance to complete two taps in an exciting contest which puts skills and muscles against the clock. The object of the competition is to tap a section of pressurized water main, attach a copper water service line and then turn on the service to see if there are any leaks. Judges critique the work and penalize for any infractions. In their first trip to nationals, Wausau placed 13th overall, with a time of 2 minute and 2 seconds.



The competition helps the teams hone their tapping skills, while also providing networking opportunities with peers from around the State. Members of the 2017 team included Captain Brandon Ball, Copper Man Rick Dorn, Cranker Floyd Smith Jr. and Star Man Ryan Fischer.

Wausau Water Works to Issue Delinquent Notices

Notices for delinquent water and sewer bills will be issued in early October to property owners and tenants. These bills are due by November 1, 2017 to avoid an additional 10% penalty. If not paid by November 15, the total owing, including the 10% penalty, will be added to the property taxes. Recent changes in the law now states that these charges may also show up in the Circuit Court Access Program (CCAP) program under the tenant's name. This could have a bearing for tenants who are looking at renting other properties and have delinquent water and sewer bills as potential landlords would be able to see that information. Water Rates Increases August 1, 2017

Water rates for City of Wausau residents increased as of August 1, 2017. For the average family of four, based on 2400 cu. ft., water rates will increase from \$66.00 to \$67.92 per quarter, or \$0.64 per month. A family of two that uses 1200 cu. ft. will likely see about a \$0.40 per month increase. Public Fire Protection fees also increased from \$9.57 to \$9.87 per quarter (based on the smallest residential meter size).

Although we understand that no one likes to see their water bills increase, we remind customers that the utility does not get any financing through the city tax rolls. Our operating revenues are solely obtained through our rates. A full schedule of rates is shown on the page 7.

Water Works to Continue Uni-Directional Flushing Program

To enhance water quality and help alleviate lead issues, the Utility will be resuming its Uni-Directional Flushing Program. The idea behind this type of flushing is to do a comprehensive flushing starting in a particular section of the city and working our way out to the far edges, flushing the water out through hydrants as we go. This systematic, high-velocity program removes settled particles and cleans underground water mains thereby enhancing the water quality.

Wausau Water Works will be sending postcards to residents as this specialized flushing is done in neighborhoods. You will be recommended not to run water while this flushing is taking place, nor should you do laundry, especially avoiding the use of bleach during this time. Department of Public Works and Utilities News

Construction Updates

2017 has been a very active year with street construction. All of our projects are currently on schedule. The proposed completion dates are as follows:

Washington Street - Oct 20 Plaza Drive - Oct 20 West Thomas Street - Nov 3 Pavement Marking (painting) - Sep 15 North 2nd Street - Oct 20 North 13th Street - Oct 20 North 4th Street Sidewalk - Sep 20 Asphalt Paving/Overlay - Oct 20

We know construction is inconvenient and can be stressful for local residents. We make every effort to keep our projects on time to minimize these issues. We appreciate everyone's patience this construction season and we hope you enjoy the completed improvements to our infrastructure.

Bio-Retention Basins - What are they?

There have been many calls and questions received related to the Bio-retention basins being installed on the West Thomas Street reconstruction project. These devices are part of the city wide stormwater plan to assist us improving the stormwater runoff quality to the ground. The relatively shallow devices promote infiltration through an excavated area that is back-filled with an engineered soil, covered with mulch and landscaped with a number of water tolerable plants. The basins are design to limit the standing stormwater depth to 6- to 12-inches and will typically drain out within 24 hours after the storm event. There are currently other basins throughout the city that are currently active and functioning very well. The WDNR has indicated they will be implementing stricter discharge limits in the not too distant future and these types of devices will help us meet those limits. These devices will be well landscaped when they are completed and the city will maintain these devices.

East Riverfront "Riverlife" Development

The final cleanup and last improvements to the new trail and public amenities along the East Riverfront will be completed in October and ready for use. Hopefully many of you have had a chance to check out the newly constructed riverfront trail and many amenities including the waterfalls, firepit, bridge lighting, river wharf and lots of public seating and landscaped areas throughout the area. The Riverwalk is open for your enjoyment. Please use this area and enjoy the river views this fall and stick around for the lights in the evening. This is a great place to enjoy Wausau and the River and be close to downtown for all of the amenities. Starting before the end of the year, foundations for the Riverlife Villages Phase 1 project will be installed for the new mixed use commercial building, high end apartments, and new townhomes along River Drive which will be under construction next year. More information at www.riverlifevillage. com. Also next year, the City will continue building out the amenities of the Riverlife Park area north of the Wausau on the Water building and under the Bridge St. bridge which will include a ropes course, bath and concession building, play and fitness equipment, a climbing wall and lots of activities for all ages. The City is now accepting donations and sponsorships for many of the public features including bricks, benches, and park features all the way up to the naming rights for the park, new pedestrian bridge and plazas. The Mayor noted at the 'illumination event' last month- if the 400 Block is Wausau's living room- then the new Riverlife area is our front porch.





What is it?

A security freeze is most commonly used as a tool to protect your "credit identity" from thieves hoping to establish unauthorized accounts or access to your credit information.

Why does it help?

Your credit report is held by the three major credit bureaus: Transunion, Equifax, and Experian. The credit report contains details of your current and past credit history, including other personal information.

When applying for, or opening, credit accounts, loans or other certain services, your credit report is reviewed by the prospective provider with

whom you are working. However, when thieves use your personal information to open credit accounts and services, your credit report is unwittingly reviewed by prospective providers on behalf of the thieves. A security freeze serves to stand in the way of the review process and helps to prevent thieves from establishing new financial obligations in your name.

What other considerations are there?

In Wisconsin, anyone is eligible to freeze their credit; this includes parents and legal guardians who want to protect the credit record of their children. A freeze does not affect your existing lines of credit - you may use existing lines of credit as you normally would use them. A freeze also does not affect your ability to review your own credit report. A freeze does not affect your credit score but it does prevent your ability to get your credit score while the freeze is in effect. You can lift a freeze but there is a cost (see the following section).

How to set it up?

You can freeze your credit by contacting each of the three credit bureaus listed above - it is recommended to freeze your credit through all three of the major bureaus if you are considering the security freeze. Victims of identity theft can have their credit frozen for free, otherwise the cost is \$10 per credit bureau. If, after implementing a credit freeze, you need to authorize third-party access to your credit report, the freeze can be lifted for a specific provider, or for a period of time. In most cases, the cost to lift the security freeze is \$10. Often, a provider can tell you which credit bureau they use for review - in that case, you should be able to lift that specific bureau's freeze, rather than lifting it from all three bureaus.

Pet Licenses Expire December 31 Each Year

Pet licenses are required for all dogs and cats more than four months of age on January 1st of any year, or four months of age within the license year, regardless of whether or not your pet goes outside.

Proof of rabies vaccination, expiration date and proof of spay or neuter is required at the time of licensing. There is an \$8.00 discount on each license if your pet is microchipped, proof is required.

The license can be obtained in a variety of ways:

- In person at the Customer Service Counter at City Hall, please bring the necessary proof of spaying or neutering, microchipping and rabies vaccination.
- Or mail a payment along with required documents to City Hall, 407 Grant Street, Wausau, WI 54403

· You can also pay and upload the required documents online and process the application electronically at https://evolveportal.ci.wausau.wi.us/.

Licensing fees for the 2018 licensing year are: an unaltered dog or cat is \$60.00 per year; an altered dog or cat is \$18.00 per year. All pets are given an \$8.00 discount if they are microchipped. Proof of microchipping is required for discount.

To avoid a late fee, all dog and cat licenses are due no later than March 31st of every year. A late fee of double the regular license fee, in addition to the required license fee is imposed if the license is obtained after March 31st. The forfeiture for NOT having a current pet license is \$187.00.

The city is taking multiple steps to become more energy efficient and learn about the prospects of photovoltaic (PV) panels, the increasingly popular type of solar panel that produces electricity.

Mayor Robert Mielke approved a request to get what is called "benchmarking" information on the city's largest buildings. Personnel from the CESA 10 Energy Management Service came over from Chippewa Falls to measure the size of city buildings and get detailed information on utility costs to operate each of those buildings.

At no cost to the city, the CESA experts are computing the operational costs - what it takes to heat, cool, light and ventilate - each building and expressing that in a cost per square foot. They work exclusively with government facilities, so the CESA personnel are familiar with these types of buildings and their expected cost of operation.

The benchmarking figures will identify where the biggest energy savings can be found. The city is not obligated to pursue any of CESA's recommendations, but if it does, CESA's "fee" is 48% of the savings experienced in the first three years.

Members of the city's Energy Team, made up of representatives of city departments, recently heard a talk where they learned how the city of Red Wing, Minn., slashed its building operational costs by 54% in five years. They have six solar installations, most of them vehicle shelters with photovoltaic panels as their roofs.

Wausau is beginning to look into the potential of such projects. The mayor's directive has been that any PV project has to produce electricity from the start at a cost that is less than the same power from the utility.

Internally, the mayor is taking a low-key step intended to simply make city staff more energy-conscious. Starting early next year, department heads responsible for buildings or vehicles are being required to simply report on their energy use for the previous year. It is expected to require little time to prepare the report, but there will be an unspoken expectation to work toward lowering the consumption and cost before the next report is due.

Odd/Even Overnight Parking

Are you confused on what side of the street to park on during the overnight hours? Have you received an overnight parking ticket and wondered why you received it? The following information should clarify the rules for overnight parking in the City of Wausau.

ALL NIGHT PARKING: Parking is allowed on City streets (other than in designated areas in downtownsee below) on an alternate side basis during the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. It is not necessary to call the Police Department for permission. Vehicles must be parked on the evennumbered side of the street on evennumbered calendar days and on the odd side of the street on odd-numbered calendar days. Odd/even parking is not allowed on streets where "No Parking" restrictions are in effect. However, odd/ even parking is not enforced on streets with "No Parking" on one side of the street only. Therefore, residents can legally park on the side not prohibitively posted regardless of the day unless a snow emergency has been declared.

Keep in mind the odd/even requirement pertains to the time period of 2:30 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. If you park your vehicle on the street in the evening intending that it will be parked overnight, make sure it is on the appropriate odd/even-numbered side of the street for the time period of 2:30 a.m. to 6:00 a.m.

DOWNTOWN AREA: Parking is not be allowed in the area (including both sides of the streets) bounded on the north by McIndoe Street, on the west by First Street, on the south by Forest Street, and on the east by Sixth Street. Persons who live downtown (and occasional visitors) can contact the Clerk/Customer Service Office (phone 715- 261-6620) to purchase monthly overnight permits to park in a City parking facility.

SNOW EMERGENCY: Overnight parking will not be allowed during snow emergencies. Residents should keep in mind that even if a snow emergency has not been declared, vehicles which are parked overnight on City streets during snowfalls may hinder snow plowing operations.

The forfeiture for violating the overnight parking ordinance is \$25.00, and is \$100.00 during snow emergencies.
