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

Absentee ballots are available for anyone that is unwilling or unable to vote at the poll site locations on Election Day. Applications for absentee ballots are available at the City Clerk/Customer Service office in City Hall, Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Additionally, you can request an absentee ballot online at: https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/.

If you are not registered to vote, if you have moved or had a name change, save time by registering to vote prior to Election Day. Registering before Election Day will speed up the process for you. When registering, you must show proof of residence: a current and valid State of Wisconsin Driver's License or State ID card, a real estate tax bill, a gas, electric, or telephone service statement (utility bill), bank statement, paycheck or pay stub, etc. You may register at the City Clerk/Customer Service office in City Hall, Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m. If your Wisconsin Driver's license is valid and unexpired, you can register to vote online at: https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/.

Photo ID is required when voting whether at the polls or at City Hall. Be prepared to show a valid photo ID, state your name and sign the poll book when voting at the poll sites.

& Transportation Master Plan Survey



Advisory Referendum Results Send a Clear Message:

Close the Dark Store Loopholes!

Wisconsin residents spoke loudly and clearly at the polls on November 6: Close the dark store loopholes and stop the tax shift from big-box retailers to homeowners and small business owners.

Twenty-three communities had ballot questions related to closing the loopholes on Tuesday. Of the more than 1 million votes cast, more than 802,000 -- almost 80% -- voted to support legislative action on this important issue.

Add those results to the overwhelming support voters showed in the two local referendums in the primary, and more than 900,000 Wisconsin residents have now stepped up to say, "Enough is enough."

"The pace of Dark Store shifts will increase in the next few years as more and more large commercial property owners tap into these loopholes," said League of Wisconsin Municipalities Executive Director Jerry Deschane. "A recent Kenosha News story reported that property tax bills for taxpayers who can't use the loopholes will increase as much as 18-percent. It's time to shut the door on this unintended tax break and protect home owners and small businesses."

"The voters have spoken and now we encourage the Governor-elect and the legislature to take up this issue and close the dark store loopholes. This is a tax shift, mainly to homeowners, and we encourage our state officials to act in January," said Wisconsin Counties Association Executive Director Mark D. O'Connell.

Wisconsin Towns Association Executive Director Mike Koles added, "Large corporations, small businesses, and home owners are all vital elements in local communities. Their success depends on being provided an array of public services like roads, police, and fire. Local governments are already capped at how much revenue can be generated to provide these critical services. The issue is not about local governments collecting more in property taxes. It is about keeping property tax bills as equitable as possible for all taxpayers. The referendum results illustrate the public's disdain for the push to have homeowners and small business shoulder an unfair portion of the responsibility."

Many state legislative candidates ran on the Dark Store Loopholes, vowing to close them. Two bills in the 2017-18 Legislature already had remarkably broad support among legislators of both parties. One bill had 84 co-sponsors (63% of the Legislature). The other had 61 co-sponsors (46% of the Legislature). If the bills had been scheduled for votes, they would have passed both houses by huge margins.



Vehicle Charging Station

a Feature at Parking Ramp

Owners of electric or plug-in hybrid vehicles are likely to know something about Wausau that the rest of us don't. There's an electric vehicle charging station near the Second Street entrance to the Jefferson Street parking ramp. They likely also know that they can top up their batteries at no cost other than feeding the parking meter.

It's intended as a courtesy, too, for out-of-town visitors. A local user of the station, Paul Kage, says an electric vehicle owner elsewhere in the state could decide to visit Wausau and possibly stay overnight based on whether there's a charging station in a convenient location in the community. Kage, who owns a Chevy Volt, says the charging station could also be a factor in someone living downtown purchasing an electric or plug-in hybrid vehicle. He uses it mainly to top off his batteries rather than for a full charge.

The charging station has put Wausau on the map, so to speak. It's listed on the internet site/cellphone app

Plugshare, along with charging stations at Northcentral Technical College, Kocourek Nissan and Courtyard by Marriott. Kwik Trip has charging stations at several of their convenience stores, but they're 110 volts and charging goes too slowly to be convenient.

City electrician Rick Pergolski said after receiving several citizen inquiries about having a charging station, the Engineering Department decided to try one. Equipment cost was about \$800 and installation last spring cost \$200.

Pergolski says part of the reason for not requiring payment is practical. The usage levels of the station have not made it worthwhile, at least not yet, for the city to buy the device that would collect payments via credit card. Kage says the parking fee for a charge usually comes to \$2.

Pet licenses are required for all dogs and cats more than four months of age on January 1st of any year, or four months of age within the license year, regardless of whether or not your pet goes outside.

Proof of rabies vaccination, expiration date and proof of spay or neuter is required at the time of licensing. There is an \$8.00 discount on each license if your pet is microchipped, proof is required.

The license can be obtained in a variety of ways:

 In person at Customer Service at City Hall. Please bring the necessary proof of spaying or neutering, microchipping and rabies vaccination.

- Or mail a payment along with required documents to City Hall, 407 Grant Street, Wausau, WI 54403
- You can also process the license application online by uploading the required documents at https://evolveportal.ci.wausau. wi.us/?portal=clerk.

Licensing fees for the 2019 licensing year are: an unaltered dog or cat is \$60.00 per year; an altered dog or cat is \$18.00 per year. All licenses are given an \$8.00 discount if the pet is microchipped. Proof of microchipping is required for discount.

To avoid a late fee, all dog and cat licenses are due no later than March 31st of every year, within thirty days of acquiring ownership of a dog or cat, or when the pet reaches four months of age. A late fee of double the regular license fee, in addition to the required license fee is imposed if the license is obtained after March 31st. The forfeiture for NOT having a current pet license is \$187.00.

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Openness & Transparency By Mayor Robert B. Mielke

Since I became Mayor, one of my main goals has been working to make City Government a more "open and transparent" process for residents to see what and how things happen and how decisions are made in local government.

That means there might be some more spirited debate, but I have been very pleased to have made these efforts... because even though all of us might not always agree on an issue, it's important to listen to all sides and understand why decisions were made by myself, the City Council and city staff.

Previously (and fairly or unfairly) the perception was thought that our public decision-making process at City Hall was not always known as being open. I am proud to have made many changes over the past 2 ½ years to improve communications. They include the following changes and improvements:

- 1. Since the beginning of my term, we have broadcast ALL of our Committee and Common Council meetings "live" via our Wausau Area Access Media webpage and public access channels # 980 & # 981 on vour television cable.
- 2. We have issued a record amount of public press/media releases and created more media roundtables/press conferences on key city issues than ever before and will continue to do so. All local media outlets have had unlimited access to myself and to all Department Heads whenever they have any questions.
- 5. Expanded our Facebook and social media presences with both our General Government page, as well as specialized pages for our Public Works, Police and Fire departments, all of which now total over 25,000 likes.
- 4. We have unveiled a new City of Wausau mobile app-(a first!) available for download from the Apple App Store and Google Play providing a wealth of city resources and information.

- 5. We have started and promoted our new www.wausome.com web homepage and Facebook page, sharing stories of civic, business and community leaders.
- 6. We created four (4) new public Commissions and Committees for further public engagement: A new Energy and Sustainability Commission which was created as a citizen advisory body to the City Council and staff on the policies, programs and decisions that affect the relationship between the City and the natural and man-made environment and how they affect the quality of life for residents. Outdoor Tips

- Drain excess water from sprinkler systems
- Disconnect garden hoses from out side faucets allowing them to drain.
- · Insulate our door faucets with foam covers

Indoor Tips



- Make sure any pipes that are at risk for freezing are well insulated.
- · Keep doors and windows in you basement closed.
- Basements should be heated to 50 degrees F.
- Leave cabinet doors open under sinks that are located on exterior walls.
- Finished basements should allow for air flow around meter, especially it meters are encased be-hind a wall.
- Space heaters may keep living areas warm, but they prevent the furnace from running allowing basement temperatures to drop and cause water pipes to freeze.

If pipes do freeze make sure you **NEVER** thaw them with an open flame!

- Turn off your main water supply
- Use a hair dryer or heat tape to thaw pipes.
- Turn on the main water supply and inspect for leaks

If cracks or leaks are found turn off main water supply and contact a plumber.





There have been reports in other communities of residents being contacted by people posing as water department employees to obtain personal information or gain access to their homes. Please be aware that all Wausau Water Works employees will arrive in vehicles marked with our logo and carry an employee I.D. If a person contacts you that you believe is suspicious, try to get a description of the vehicle or individual and report the incident immediately to the Wausau Police Department.

What is a Cross-Connection?

A cross-connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water (potable) supply and a source of contamination or pollution. State plumbing codes require approved backflow prevention methods to be installed at every point of potable water connection and use. Cross-Connections must be properly protected or

How does contamination occur?

When you turn on your faucet, you expect the water to be as safe as when it left the treatment plant. However, certain hydraulic conditions left unprotected within your plumbing system may allow hazardous substances to contaminate your own drinking water or even the public water supply.

Water normally flows in one direction. However, under certain conditions, water can actually flow backwards: this is known as Backflow. There are two situations that can cause water to flow backward: back siphonage and backpressure.

Backsiphonage

May occur due to a loss of pressure in the municipal water system during a fire fighting emergency, a water main break or system repair. This creates a siphon in your plumbing system which can draw water out of a sink or bucket and back into your water or the public water system.

Backpressure

May be created when a source of pressure (such as a boiler) creates a pressure greater than the pressure supplied from the public water system. This may cause contaminated water to be pushed into your plumbing system through an unprotected cross-connection.



In the Bathroom - Toilet Tanks

There are many unapproved toilet tank fill valve products sold at common retailers which do not meet the state plumbing code requirements for backflow prevention.

- Look for the ASSE #1002 Standard symbol on the device and packaging.
- Replace any unapproved devices with an ASSE #1002 approved anti-siphon fill valve device. Average cost is typically \$12 to \$22 at home
- Verify overflow tube is one inch below critical level (CL) marking on the device.



Insights to protect your drinking water

Do...

- Keep the ends of hoses clear of all possible
- Make sure dishwashers are installed with a proper
- Verify and install a simple hose bibb vacuum breaker on all threaded faucets around your home.
- Make sure water treatment devices such as water softeners have the proper "air gap", which is a minimum of one inch above any drain.

Hose bibb Vacuum Breaker

Don't...

- Submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs, sinks or
- Use spray attachments without a backflow prevention device.
- Connect waste pipes from water softeners or other treatment systems directly to the sewer or submerged drain pipe. Always be sure there is a one inch "air gap" separation.

In the Kitchen

Hoses and water treatment devices may create a potential backflow hazard if not properly isolated with backflow prevention methods.

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Adopt a Hydrant

As winter comes and drops that snowy blanket on everything, it's important to remember vour neighborhood fire hydrant as you're shoveling or snow blowing. Remember, keeping hydrants free of snow and accessible to fire fighters could mean saving your property or your neighbors and could mean the difference between life and death.

Street Department News

Sand Barrels

To help property owners keep their sidewalks safe during the winter, the Department of Public Works has over 100 sand barrels placed throughout the city. The barrels are filled with a sand and salt mixture that is effective for helping to melt icy spots as well as adding grit to slippery sidewalks. If you notice that a sand barrel is getting low in your area please contact DPW at 715-261-6790 and let them know the location so it can get refilled. Snow Emergencies

When substantial amounts of snow are predicted or have fallen in a short period of time it may be necessary for the Department of Public Works to declare a snow emergency. The purpose of a snow emergency is to minimize the number of vehicles parked on the streets so the snow plow operators can effectively and safely clear the streets of snow. Parking on City streets during snow emergencies will result in issuance of a parking citation with a fine of \$100 and/or the vehicle being towed. When declared, the City will publish the snow emergency using various local media outlets and an announcement will be placed on the City website and Facebook pages.

Riverview Terrace Assisted Living

Riverview Terrace Assisted Living is a 36-unit Residential Care Apartment Complex (RCAC) located on Thomas Street in the heart of Wausau. The RCAC facility is licensed to provide residents up to 28 hours per week of supportive, personal and nursing services. Riverview Terrace offers a subsidized rent and a flat monthly service fee for those in need of daily living assistance. This facility is owned and operated by the Wausau Community Development Authority (WCDA) and, as part of the organization's mission; we provide affordable housing with a suitable living environment free from discrimination.
